rect idea of some of the attributes of God, but an absolutely false conception of others. The conception of God is too negative. Absolute sovereignty and ruthless omnipotence are his chief attributes, while his character is impersonal. The Christian truth, that "God is love," is to the learned Moslem blasphemy and to the ignorant an enigma.

The monotheism of Mohammed must be

distinguished from that of the Bible. James

Freeman Clarke calls it the "worst form of

monotheism," and sums up the distinction

thus: "Islam saw God, but not man; saw

the claims of deity, but not the rights of

humanity; saw authority, but failed to see

freedom-therefore hardened into despotism,

stiffened into formalism, and sank into death.

Moses teaches a God above us, and yet with us,

Jesus Christ teaches God above us, God with us,

Mohammed teaches a God above us;
