ter's voice afresh, with ringing words of encouragement: 'Have faith in God.' 'Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall say unto this mountain, Be thou taken up and cast into the sea; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that what he saith cometh to pass; he shall have it! Nothing shall be impossible unto you.'"

The Crowning Challenge These urgent appeals from living missionaries who form the long, thin line on the forefront of battle against Islam must not fall on deaf ears. They are a challenge to faith and to sacrifice. They are a call for immediate reinforcements, for more laborers, and for more efficient preparation in those sent out.

The Kind of Men Needed For the evangelization of the Mohammedan world we need, first and most of all, men; "the best men," says Dr. Wherry, "the Church can afford—men who, in the spirit of Henry Martyn, Isidor Loewenthal, Ion Keith-Falconer, Bishop French, Peter Zwemer, and many others gone to their reward, hold not their lives dear; men who carry the burden of these millions of Moslems upon their hearts, and, with Abraham of old, cry out: 'O that Ishmael might live before thee!'" For in the last analysis the evangelization of the Mohammedan world depends, under God, on a band of volunteers prepared to do pioneer work and ready to sacrifice life itself,
